Sept. 8, 1955

The literary and classic influence in street names can be found in Antioch, Aurora, Byron Streets, Arcadian and Racine Avenues. The modern suburban influence on the other hand is reflected in Bel-Ayr Dr., Glenn Dr., Cumberland Dr., Meadow Lark Lane, Hawthorn Dr. and Bluebird Terrace.

In the department of confusion we have Pleasant St., and Pleasant-Prospect Ave., and Prospect Ct., Sunkist Ave., and Sunset Dr.; Oakland Ave., and Oaklawn Ave; Orchard Ave. and Orchard Pl.

To add to the confusion, there is Frame Park along the Fox River; and Frame Ave., in another part of the city.

43 years ago  
Sept. 8, 1973

New regulations on billing practices for automotive repairs may go into effect in Wisconsin this winter if the state attorney general's office has its way.

They could save the customer money, and he'd know more precisely how long it took a mechanic to do the repair job and who the mechanic was.

Dealers now don't have to tell the customer either of those things.

The proposed new rules are the result of state Justice Dept. action against 12 Madison area auto dealers this past summer.

Special orders were issued by the state Agriculture Dept. under laws concerning unfair business practices. They require that dealers and employees must tell customers the actual time required to complete repairs if customers ask for the information.

Also, if customers ask, the bill must give the mechanic's name.

Both must be disclosed if the dealers use the so-called flat-rate method of billing. Under the flat-rate system, each job is given a pre-determined rate regardless of time required to complete it.

Sept. 8, 1565 — A Spanish expedition established the first permanent European settlement in North America at present-day St. Augustine, Fla.

Sept. 8, 1761 — Britain's King George III married Princess Charlotte of Mecklenburg-Strelitz a few hours after meeting her for the first time.

Sept. 8, 1892 — An early version of "The Pledge of Allegiance," written by Francis Bellamy, appeared in "The Youth's Companion."

Sept. 8, 1974 — President Gerald R. Ford granted a "full, free, and absolute pardon" to former President Richard Nixon covering his entire term in office.

Sept. 8, 1985 — Pete Rose of the Cincinnati Reds tied Ty Cobb's career record for hits, singling for hit number 4,191 during a game against the Cubs in Chicago.

Sept. 8, 1986 — "The Oprah Winfrey Show" began the first of 25 seasons in national syndication.

# Feline from local groomer proves to be cat's meow

Heavnsent's Husky earns lifetime achievement award

WAUKESHA — Did you hear the one about the Siberian Husky cat?

It's worthy of an award — several of them, actually, with Husky, a Siberian bred by Heavnsent Siberians in Oconomowoc, having proven himself to be at least of nobility in the regal world of felines.

Angela Ng, owner of Paws for a Moment Pet Spa & Boutique in Waukesha, is the owner of the 2-year-old Siberian cat named L.A. SGCA Heavnsent Im a Lil Husky — "Husky;" the GCA stands for Grand Champion Alter, the designation for show cats who have been spayed and neutered. L.A. stands for Lifetime Achievement, a prestigious honor in the show cat world that follows after cats gain two regional awards and one international award and Best in Breed. Ng received the honor on Husky's behalf recently in San Diego.

"In the cat world we call it pedigree rather than purebred, meaning they have papers. A lot of the breeds do come from a mix of different foundations. His breed being a Siberian is a naturally occurring forest cat. ... Some of your other breeds like Persians had some different breeds bred into them to what we now call a Persian. Basically if you went to Siberia, Russia, he'd be similar to what you find in the feral cat population," Ng said.

"A Lifetime Achievement Award is

the highest distinction a cat can get in (The International Cat Association) because it requires multiple seasons and multiple awards and you are beating out a lot of cats. Some cats don't get it until they are 10 years old and some cats never get it. TICA (The International Cat Association) is worldwide — clubs in China and South America and heavily in Europe and throughout the U.S., Canada and Mexico, so he beat out cats all over the world."

The truth is where most cats are finicky, Ng said Husky basks in the attention he receives. And he's well-traveled, too, having been to shows in numerous states. To Husky, "every hotel is a Hilton," Ng said. He is calm, easygoing, and friendly, personality traits that help impress the judges, Ng said.

And that's not by accident.

Finicky about cats

Shelly Finley, owner of Heavnsent Siberians in Oconomowoc, has been breeding Siberians for 10 years — the breed first arrived in the U.S. in 1990 and its lines are still relatively pure. They are among the least allergenic cats in the world and very doglike — where many people think of cats as skittish or standoffish, Siberians enjoy being in the middle of things, thrive in households with children and don't like being alone, Finley said.

That's both a function of nature and nurturing. Finley said she is very

picky about breeders, having worked with only four across the nation. And she takes great pains to socialize her kitties very early on, working with them around the clock so they have the right personalities to interact with their families. She guarantees the temperament of her Siberians where a lot of breeders may not, she said, and has placed cats in over 200 homes without a complaint.

In addition, Husky's father, Raja, also is a multiple award-winner, racking up seven Best Cat of Show awards in 2007-008, winning the Cat Fanciers of America's 3rd Best Siberian in the Nation Award in 2008-09 and many more.

"They have no negatives; they are genetically sound, breeders haven't ruined them. They will be your best friends," Finley said. "I've shown extensively and seen every breed out there and I still think this is the best breed in the world."

And for Ng, she's also enjoyed showing Husky and receiving the awards he's merited. She said Husky takes his life's work in stride and is the happiest cat with a charming personality that shows "he's having a blast."

So who needs nine lives when Husky is living a full one?

"We try to make every aspect of it fun. If they are not having fun there is no point in doing it. It's always about him first," Ng said. "He's my spoiled pampered pet."

Other Waukesha schools to have requests granted include Banting, Blair, Hawthorne, Prairie and Waukesha STEM-Randall elementary schools and Butler Middle School.

An estimated 2,678 Waukesha students are expected to benefit from funding projects, according to the district.

More requests

Meanwhile, following Tuesday's announcement, Herb Kohl Philanthropies also vowed to match the funding for DonorChoose.org requests moving forward.

That inspired Wales Elementary teacher Karrie Winkelman to request \$496 of supplies for her 46 students, who have special needs. The funding would support sensory tools and equipment for students, including elliptical pedals to "get their wiggles out," sand and magic beads to help them regain focus and a chin-up bar to help students exert angry energy in a positive way. Those additions would be integrated into the school's new sensory room.

"Sensory supplies are really expensive," Winkelman said. "We were fortunate to get some of what we needed through the normal budget;

that only went so far."

Winkelman said she was familiar with the crowdfunding site and decided to post her request on a whim. She didn't even know about the organization's pledge to match donations when she posted it Wednesday night.

She said she's "eternally grateful" to philanthropists who support public education.

"Our schools have been stripped of funding, unfortunately, and that's nothing that the district can help," she said. "So when individuals like Herb Kohl step up and donate to our classrooms and directly impact the students through their donations, it's amazing and unbe-

lievable." Karel Corredor, a first-grade dual language teacher at Heyer Elementary School, echoed those sentiments. She's decided to request match-grant funding for "wobble chairs" in her classroom to allow students to sit comfortably, concentrate, promote proper posture and help with balance.

"I feel blessed because this foundation really knows how teachers struggle to get supplies, to get things that they believe are good for students," she said. "I feel really excited about it and I think it's going to motivate more people to give."
